Additional support was given to focus pupils in Maths and Literacy. An additional adult was employed for this task who not only is a qualified teacher but is also a Headteacher.	Children who were given this additional support made better rates of progress than would have done otherwise. They were given a better understanding of basic Numeracy and Literacy skills.	Pupil tracking and the books they produced showing their work with the additional adult.
Extra TA hours were used to focus on focus children in some year groups. This supported academic progress in these class groups.	The extra support from TA staff supported a range of children with varied needs.	Children made satisfactory or better rates of progress due to this additional support.

The Pupil Premium is an element of school funding aimed at narrowing the gap in attainment between certain disadvantaged groups of pupils and those who are more well off. In 2012-13 funding was calculated on the basis of £600 for each pupil who has been eligible for free school meals in the past six years, and for looked after children in care for more than six months. There is a related Service premium of £250 for children of families in the armed services.

The funding is provided to schools, which decide how best to spend this according to local needs.
